Next week, Monday 15th to Friday 19th November, Edgewood will be celebrating **Geography Awareness Week**.

Established more than 25 years ago by The National Geographic Society, this annual public awareness program encourages citizens young and old to think and learn about the significance of place and how we affect and are affected by it. Each third week of November, students, families and community members around the globe focus on the importance of geography by hosting events; using lessons, games, and challenges in the classroom; and often meeting with policymakers and business leaders.

Across all year groups at Edgewood, teachers will lead engaging discussions about what geography is, teach lessons to sharpen children's map skills and share lots of ideas about how we can all be better global citizens.

One of the most fantastic things about Geography Awareness Week is that you can participate from home, too!

This year, we are inviting you to join us from home by helping our school to support the citizen science project **Globe at Night**. Globe at Night is an international citizen-science campaign to raise public awareness of the impact of light pollution by inviting citizen-scientists to measure and submit their night sky brightness observations.
